While we were there, we were able to settle on the banquet venue and hammer out the room deal.

As winter approached, my attention turned to the designs for the graphics for the shirts. In January, the project started in earnest when we contracted with a

After a couple of revisions, we settled on a design, and pricing so Dale could get an order form up on the RMC website along with the other forms and important information.

During the ensuing months leading up to our early June event date, we came up with a budget for the awards, and kept pushing forward on getting our approvals in place so we could hold the car show along Elk Ave. It was touch and go there for a while, but in the 11th hour everything came through for us. All the while, I had this crazy idea in the back of my head to turn the junk case halves out of Tony's '64 Spyder (I'll let him tell the story as to why they came to be junk) into a man cave end table for the raffle. After abandoning it more than once, I convinced myself that it was worthwhile. After some searching, I came up with a piece of glass that would work for the top at a Habitat for Humanity store. I had to pay for a whole end table just for the glass but it seemed worth it. From there, I machined pieces of 1" aluminum round stock to make the legs and stand offs for the top. A couple coats of paint, a handful of bolts, and viola a pretty cool table if I say so myself. It was a strong draw for raffle tickets. As we got towards the end of April, we closed out the t-shirt order form, and placed our order, adding a few extra in the more popular sizes and style, just in case. A few of these were sold during registration. While it wasn't a great number, we did have more than a few shirts that were ordered and not picked up that definitely hurt our bottom line. There will be a few shirts available for sale at the next RMC meeting including a couple 2xl Polo shirts. Well, those are the high points of what we did leading up to the event, there were lots of moving parts some more important than others, but in the end, and with a ton of hard work from my team, everything came together for a fairly

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

Weekend in Crested Butte

I have just returned from the 34th annual Tri-State meet in Crested Butte. In my opinion this was one of the best Tri-State meets in recent memory. Both for how well the meet was run but also the ambiance of the location. Crested Butte is not the typical mountain town. It is a mountain resort town, well to do, with many high-end amenities and upscale lodging, even in the summer. When the club decided on Crested Butte it was a factor of both a change of pace as well as a let's see attitude. I need to mention that the resort hotel folks were very accommodating as well as the town of Crested Butte which allowed for their downtown main street to be blocked off for a Saturday morning. The drive from Denver to Crested Butte was a bit daunting, 240-mile drive with Monarch Pass in the way. However, all the Rocky Mountain and PPCC club cars made the trip without any problems. Also, there were cars from Albuquerque, Oklahoma, Wichita, Salt Lake City, Grand Junction and Ute Trails. There were 42 Corvairs in all, parked on a wide ramp behind the hotel. It was a real bonus to have all the cars together at the hotel. After registration we were on our own to explore the town for dinner. There were many restaurants both in the resort and the town 3 miles away. Saturday morning early the drivers met and drove to town by category. First, the early coupes and convertibles (15) and the one sedan left. Then the Lakewood wagons (3) and, one Rampside. The late model coupes and convertibles and one sedan (20) followed. After arriving in town, the cars parked diagonally for presentation. It was well organized with the car front ends pointed out with just enough room between for viewing. The Lates on the west side, the earlies on the east. The townsfolk as well as other visitors came out in number. I personably enjoyed talking to several visitors during my stay. They mostly were former Corvair owners and fairly knowledgeable. Stories to tell, of course. The most impressive part of the show were the 9 early convertibles. Quite a showing. I don't believe we have seen that number at a Tri-State gathering before. There were shops and restaurants to shop and eat when the sun became a bit too hot so the time passed quickly. At 1:00 pm the show and shine was over, one by one the cars were driven off main street. Some folks staved for lunch while others drove back to the resort.

The show and shine is half of the Tri- State events. The other half was the banquet. 125 attended the banquet. The resort put on a decent dinner, a Mexican buffet. The food was good and the line moved quickly. Ed Halpin was appointed master of ceremonies. He did a masterful job. Everything moved quickly with very little 'dead' time. It was quite entertaining with the raffle and the awards intermingled. The main awards were as follows:

Mark Welt won the Hard luck award with an interesting and funny story of his trip to Crested Butte from Oklahoma. He started out driving his car but it developed engine problems. He was traveling with a friend who was towing a car. He was offered this car to drive but at Monarch Pass the borrowed car engine Temp light came on several times. He said it took several hours to transverse the pass. He did make it to Crested Butte and the repairs to both cars turned out to be minor. Dave Olwine won the Distance award hands down. He had driven his Spyder convertible to Indiana for the Indy 500. From there he drove to Atlanta for his niece's wedding. She had requested the car. Returning he drove straight through to Crested Butte for a total distance of 3450 miles. No one else came close to this distance. For the record RMC won the attendance with 21 members and 43 people attending from the club. Rob Brereton accepted the traveling trophy on behalf of the club.

The final award presented was the Francis Boydston award. This award is selected by the hosting club to recognize the individual who has done the most to promote the club and club activities the preceding 3 years. The winner was

Dale Nielsen, a longtime member of the RMC club and the RMC website manager. His contribution to the club has been invaluable over the past several years.

Lastly, we need to recognize Rick Beets and his crew; Ken Schifftner, Mike Piper, Tony Lawler, Karen Piper, Diane Lawler, Ed Halpin, and Chris Kimberly for putting this Tri-State together. Tibits about Crested Butte

During the Museum Tour, Glo ("Gloria") gave us some tidbits of info you may want to use for any commentary.

- 1. CB has a very rare two (2) story outhouse. The lower one was used during the warmer months and the second floor one was used during the snow season. No, the upper is NOT directly over the lower.
- 2. The town has gotten snow multiple times on July 4th. The last frost is usually mid to late June.
- 3. CB was basically a "wooden" town thus many of the older buildings are gone. Some other resort type towns have older, brick or stone buildings but are of similar vintage.
- 4. The town once went from about 1500 permanent residences to less than 150 people. The closing of the mine was the primary cause of the decrease.
- 5. CB is rare that it has both hard and soft coal deposits. Both were mined. Many of the buildings were hotels for miners who worked seasonally.
- 6. Some coal deposits are well over 2000 feet into the mountain. The added cost to remove this "long distance" coal added economic pressure to close the mine.
- 7. The "Company Store" was just that...owned and operated by the mining company. Workers were given vouchers deducted from their paychecks to be used at the Company Store. However, somewhat unique to CB a competitor was located nearby thus the Company Store generally had prices that were more competitive than those at other similar arrangements.
- 8. The typical early buildings were small wooden structures (almost like cottages). Over the years, other sections were added to the buildings. Later, false from fronts were applied giving that "Wild West" look. Nearly all buildings had (and still have) steel roofs set at high angles to resist snow loads.
- 9. One walkway between buildings is so narrow and protected from the sun that it fills with snow early and the snow doesn't melt until late Spring or even early Summer.
- 10. The early settlers were mostly European Catholic. They brought with them hops (to make beer). Some of the original hop plants are still growing in CB. I noticed and can confirm that beer is still being sold.
- 11. Once a year, by law, cattle ranchers are allowed to bring their cattle down Elk Avenue. (I wonder who cleans up afterwards?).
